TEAMWORK "DELIVERS" TO STAMP OUT HUNGER

On Saturday, May 12th, the National Association of Letter Carriers held their 20th annual Stamp Out Hunger food collection in every town in America. This campaign is a partnership between the U.S. Postal Service, Campbell Soup Company, Valpak, United Way, AFL-CIO, Feeding America, Uncle Bob's Self-Storage, and AARP. Each year the need increases for food to help residents in need, and Barrington is no exception.

This year, a new partnership emerged as Bob Meloni, Barrington letter carrier and local shop steward, worked diligently to have Barrington's ABLE group become one of the approved recipients of the food.

"We're glad to help. As long as the food is going to needy families, that's all that matters," Bob said as he helped load hundreds of bags of food collected from generous Barrington residents into cars and SUVs.

Barrington residents came through in a big way, donating enough bags of food to fill a conference room at the municipal building. A team of volunteers, including borough employees and their

families, council members, and other ABLE volunteers from the local churches, gathered at the Barrington Post Office to load the food from the loading dock into the cars and SUVs for transport to the municipal building.

"It is heartwarming to see, once again, the generosity of the families in Barrington," noted one volunteer.

An hour later, the conference room was full and the helpers were sore, but very uplifted to be reminded of the kind and caring residents we have here in Barrington. The food will now be sorted and stored in the municipal building to prepare for the ABLE group's food distribution to Barrington residents in need, on June 16th. IN THE ZONE

George W. Jones, Zoning Administrator

To: All Property Owners and Residents

If you have any Zoning or proposed construction questions contact George Jones, Zoning Administrator at 856-547-4040. Zoning Application has a fee of \$40.00. There is no fee for handicap ramps, but a Zoning Application must be made before you build. Ramps are temporary in nature and shall be removed when no longer required.

Important Information for 2012

1. That you must complete a Zoning Application along with a copy of your plot plan (survey) to secure authorization and/or permits to: (applies to all commercial & residential districts) (prior to any construction projects)

- ~A. Erect a fence on your property; to include new or replacement of old fencing.
- ~B. Construct or erect a swimming pool {pools must be in a fenced yard, fence height four (4) feet (minimum) with self closing, self latching, lockable gates. **Pools must be ten [10] feet from any property line or any structure**
- ~C. To build an addition to your home. ***All construction may require a drainage/grading engineer's plan & escrow.**
- ~D. To add a deck to your home. ***All construction**

may require a drainage/grading engineer's plan & escrow.

- ~E. Build, replace or rebuild your front porch, patios or steps, **or add a handicap ramp.**
- ~F. Erect a shed in your rear yard. Includes new or replacement. **Must be five [5] feet from property lines**
- ~G. Build a garage or accessory building or structure. ***All construction may require a drainage/grading engineer's plan & escrow**
- ~H. Erect signs in a commercial zoning district (include color drawings). This includes replacing old signs. (Contractors signs must be removed as soon as work is completed.)
- ~I. Construct open or covered patios
- ~J. Construct driveways and aprons
- ~K. Operate a business in your home
- ~L. All Businesses must register at Municipal Building. For info call 856-547-0706
- ~M. Lot coverage is limited to 40% of the lot, includes all structures, pools, sheds, driveways & walk ways

2. That the following are not permitted in any Barrington Zoning District,

- ~A. The parking of vehicles on front, side or rear yards on unpaved impervious surfaces (Chapter 85)
- ~B. Keeping unlicensed or unregistered vehicles

- on your property in any residential or commercial district (Chapter 95)
- ~C. Signs of any commercial venture or business in a residential zoning district (except for a real estate sign on the premises, the maximum size is six [6] square feet
- ~D. Duplex or two family homes in a residential district
- ~E. Off premises directional signs for a commercial business
- ~F. Business or commercial equipment parked or stored on streets in any district, must be behind the front corner of the building or house
- ~G. Operating a business in a residential district that has signs, more than one employee (this means property owner) and traffic to the property
- ~H. Sheds garages or other structures in the front or side yards
- ~I. Boats, trucks, trailers can be parked on driveway, beyond front corner of the house, into front yard area; but not parked in the streets

4. Under 128-13. Definitions. Family; Five (5) or more persons related by blood, marriage or adoption, occupying a dwelling unit, living together and maintaining a common household, including not more than one (1) boarder, roomer or lodger. Not more than three (3) unrelated persons are permitted to occupy a dwelling unit; living together and maintaining a common household.

HAZARDOUS WASTE: Camden County Household Special Waste Collection dates: June 23rd Gloucester Twp., September 15th Pennsauken, October 20th Lindenwold, 8:30 am - 3:00 pm, for more information on these events, call the Camden County Division of Environmental Affairs at: (856) 858-5241, proof of residency required.

CAMDEN COUNTY ELECTRONICS RECYCLING EVENTS: June 23rd Gloucester Twp. (8:30 am - 3:00 pm) October 27th Lindenwold (8:30 am - 12:30 pm), for more info. on these events, call the Camden County Division of Environmental Affairs at (856) 858-5241, proof of residency required.

BOROUGH ELECTRONICS RECYCLING: Residents can bring their E-waste to the DPW yard for disposal. Hours for drop off are Monday thru Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The following items can be disposed of as E-Waste:

15, 17, 19, 21 Inch Monitors, Flat Screens and All-In-Ones • Towers, Desktops and Laptops • Uninterrupted Power Supply • Keyboards, Mouse and Speakers • All Type of Wire • Gold Clip Ends Printers, Fax Machines, Scanners, Modems, Copy Machines • All Type of Memory • Any Hard Drives Fans and Power Supplies • Mother, B, C, Tweeter and Finger Boards • AC Adaptors, Yokes and Motors Plastic, Baled or Loose • Aluminum, Brass, Light Iron and Copper • Metals, Baled or Loose • Any and All Related Computer Parts • Phones, Cell Phones, Cell Phone and Laptop Batteries • PC Scrap and Stereos (No Wood) • VCR's, DVD's, CD Players, Boom Boxes • Any Audio and Visual Equipment • Scanners and Pagers • Cash Registers and Scales (Electronic or Mechanical) • Rechargeable Batteries • Household Appliance Not Containing Compressors • Televisions

As of January 1, 2011 it is now mandatory to recycle covered electronic devices according to State law entitled "The Electronic Waste Management Act". The Borough of Barrington DPW began accepting electronics in 2010 and recycled 3.30 tons, in 2011 the Borough recycled 13.91 tons. If residents have electronic items such as televisions that are too heavy or burdensome to drop off to the DPW please call and we will make arrangements to pick up. Please be advised that any electronic items put to the curb for trash will not be picked up. TEXTILE DONATIONS: The Borough has (2) textile donation containers, (1) located at the Borough Hall parking lot and (1) located at the entrance gate to the DPW. Residents may drop off clothing, shoes, blankets, draperies, sheets, and any other type of textiles. Please do not drop off any items that are contaminated, meaning items that are wet, soiled, etc. Items other than those mentioned are not acceptable.

CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS: Homeowner's are limited to (5) containers per week. Please do not pile debris at the curb because it will not be picked up unless it is in a container. If you are remodeling yourself

or using a private contractor and will be in excess of the amount described herein you will need to arrange for private disposal.

VEGETATIVE WASTE PICK UP: Vegetative waste pick up is every Monday. Vegetative waste is defined as grass clippings, sticker balls, acorns, pinecones and viney type materials such as ivy, honey suckle, poison ivy, laurel and plant clippings. Vegetative waste can be put in 30-gallon containers not weighing more than 50 lbs. and/or contractor grade trash bags weighing not more than 25 lbs., please leave plastic bags untied it will allow the crews to move along much quicker. Please no dirt or sod. Vegetative waste containers can be obtained at the Borough Hall for a nominal fee. If residents still have loose leaves for pick up you may bag them and put out for vegetative waste pick up. Due to the heavy volume your pick up may not be completed on the scheduled pickup day, just leave at curb and it will be picked up the following day.

CAR BATTERIES: Can be disposed of at most local auto part stores for a nominal fee or can be disposed of at Camden County Hazardous waste drop off sites. For dates & times please call the CCDEA at 856-858-5241. Do not put curbside for recycling or trash pickup.

TIRES - RESIDENTIAL: (2) tires per week per household, must be off the rims and can be put to curb for trash pickup. If tires are on the rims they will not be picked up.

CONCRETE: The Borough provides a pick up on Thursdays of small amounts. Pick up by the Borough must be called into the DPW office prior to Thursday by calling 547-2486 ext. 13.

If you or a contractor are replacing your sidewalk and/or driveway or any other type of renovation work you will need to arrange for private disposal.

BRUSH PICK UP: The Borough provides a pick up on Mondays. Includes tree limbs and trimmings, brush with roots removed and stumps not more than twelve (12) inches in diameter. Brush, limbs and stumps should be no longer than 4ft. and stacked neatly curbside so not to protrude into the street or block the sidewalk. If stumps are more than 12" in diameter call the DPW office for special pick up, prior to Thursday. Any tree work done by a contractor is the responsibility of the contractor to dispose of debris. Any tree removal work done by a homeowner is the responsibility of the homeowner to dispose of all resulting debris. Place brush, limbs, stumps, curbside the night before collection but no earlier than 1:00 p.m. the day preceding collection to ensure that your brush, limbs, stumps, will be picked up. Do not place brush, limbs, stumps, in the street, as this is a dangerous practice that may cause a liability problem. Brush, limbs, stumps, placed on the park strip will not harm the grass. Due to the heavy volume your pick up may not be completed on the scheduled pickup day, just leave at the curb and it will be picked up the following day.

STUMP PICK UP: The Borough provides a pick up on Thursdays of small amounts. Pick up by the Borough must be called into the DPW Office prior to Thursday by calling 547-2486 ext 13. If a resident has

a contractor do any tree work the contractor is responsible for removing all debris

WOODEN FENCING & R.R. TIES: The Borough provides a pickup of small amounts that should be no longer than 4' and limited to no more than 10 pieces per week. Pick up by the Borough will be on Fridays and is to be put curbside for trash pickup. If a contractor is doing the work the contractor is responsible for disposing of the debris.

WASTE OIL: Waste oil may be brought to the Public Works Garage Monday thru Friday 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Please do not drop off after hours and leave at gate. Proof of residency required.

SCRAP METAL – Over the past few years the Borough has seen a steady decline in our recycling rate for scrap metal due to scavengers. In an effort to curb scavengers residents are asked to wait until the morning of pick up to put out items to the curb, you can also bring your scrap metal items to the DPW yard Monday thru Friday during normal business hours, 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., for disposal in our scrap metal dumpster, or if you can contact the DPW ahead of time and we may be able to make arrangements for a pick up prior to your regularly scheduled pick up date if our schedule and manpower allows.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE: Memorial Day – Monday May 28th, all services will be rescheduled for the following day Tuesday, May 29th. Independence Day, Wednesday, July 4th, all services will be rescheduled for Thursday July 5th.

TRASH AND RECYCLING: Must be placed curbside by 6:00 a.m. on the day of collection but no sooner than 1:00 p.m. the day preceding collection. A copy of the trash and recycling regulations can be obtained at the Borough Hall or online at www.barringtonboro.com. Please remember to secure your trash properly. The Borough frequently receives complaints about unsecured trash littering the streets on windy days.

DIG SAFELY: Homeowners are reminded that prior to any type of excavation work you are required to call the New Jersey One Call Center at 1-800-272-1000 or 811 to request a mark out of all underground utilities. This is the law in New Jersey and is for your safety. Examples of excavation could be but are not limited to landscaping, irrigation systems, fence installations, concrete work, etc. If you have a contractor doing your work the contractor should be aware of this requirement also. If you see colored paint markings in the road or colored flags on your property, these are utility markings. Yellow = Gas, Red = Electric, Orange = Communication/ CATV, Blue = Water, Green = Sanitary Sewer, White = Proposed excavation area.

STREET SWEEPER – The goal of the Dept. is to sweep the whole town two to three times a year. Once in the early Spring, once in the late Spring and/or early Summer and once in the late Summer. We will advertise on channel 19 and post signs in your district the week prior. In order to provide a more efficient job, residents will need to move their cars off the street on your scheduled week. Every effort will be made to stay on schedule but delays can happen due to manpower, breakdowns, weather, etc.

SWIMMING SEASON and SAFETY

The season of opening and installing new swimming pools is upon us. It's a time of preparation for summer fun and relaxation for family and friends of all ages, and especially for the young.

New Installations

- State law requires ANY pool -regardless of its construction design- that holds 24" of water or has a filter - to be permitted through the Construction Office. All pools over 24" deep require barrier protection (fencing) and electrical compliance. Information Packets for new installations are available in the Construction Office for the do-it-yourself homeowners. Department store pools that are "portable" and can hold 24" of water, still **REQUIRE** fencing

at least 48" high, and new installations **REQUIRE** a permit.

Pool safety and security can keep your summer safe and still fun. The following are some tips for existing pool owners to help insure a fun filled summer.

Safety

- There is no better method of safety than diligent adult supervision.
- Establish rules for conduct in and around the pool.
- Never operate electrical equipment or appliances when wet or in wet areas.

Security

- Check all fencing for possible repairs/no opening should be penetrable be a 4" sphere.
- All yard gates should be out swing with latches that

self secure.

-All gate latches should be 54" above the ground and mounted outside the pool area.

-All electrical work is required to be GFCI (ground fault) protected and motors (filter) need to be bonded.

There is no way to be "TOO SAFE" when it comes to pools. Shockingly statistics show that a drowning occurs in the United States every 5 minutes. Accidents can and do happen. Supervision, strict rules of pool side etiquette, and proper maintenance of security features, will minimize the chance, of injury and potential tragedy.

There's a New Property Maintenance Officer in Town

Let me introduce myself, my name is Jim Mchugh, and I will be the new property maintenance officer for the Boro of Barrington. I handle all property maintenance complaints for the entire town. If you should have any questions or concerns, feel free to contact me at my office Monday thru Friday 7:00am to 3:30pm @856-547-2486 ext 15.

Standards for property maintenance of exterior of property:

1. Unregistered and abandoned vehicles are prohibited in the street and on private property
2. no vehicles are permitted to be parked on any lawns whether it be front, side, or rear of property (must be on a paved surface)
3. all areas shall be kept free of uncontrolled overgrown grass, weeds, plant growth,

- and vegetation
4. all areas shall be kept free of dangerously loose and overhanging tree limbs or dead trees
5. all the exterior of the premises shall be kept free of animal excrement

These are just a few common items that generally create the most complaints. If anyone would like a copy of the property maintenance ordinance, you can pick up a copy at the borough hall or the public works facility. If anyone has any questions in regards to property maintenance or a complaint to be investigated, please don't hesitate to call me.

Let's all work together to keep Barrington a beautiful community.

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STORMWATER PROGRAM REGULATIONS

CONTAINERIZED YARD WASTE – Per ordinance # 813 – Prohibited conduct – The owner or occupant of any property, or any employee or contractor of such owner or occupant engaged to provide lawn care or landscaping services, shall not sweep, rake, blow or otherwise place yard waste, unless the yard waste is containerized, in the street. If yard waste that is not containerized is placed in the street, the party responsible for placement of yard waste must remove the yard waste from the street or said party shall be deemed in violation of this ordinance.

PRIVATE STORM DRAIN RETROFITTING – Per ordinance #933 – property owners must retrofit existing storm drain inlets which are in direct contact with repaving, repairing, reconstruction, or resurfacing or alterations of facilities on private property, to prevent the discharge of solids and floatables (such as plastic bottles, cans, food wrappers and other litter) to the municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Barrington so as to protect public health, safety and welfare. If you are performing any of the above mentioned items you will need to meet the new storm drain inlet design standards. Please contact the DPW if you have any questions.

REFUSE CONTAINERS/DUMPSTERS – per ordinance #933 – requires dumpsters

and other refuse containers that are outdoors or exposed to stormwater to be covered at all times, and prohibits the spilling, dumping or leaking, or otherwise discharge of liquids, semi-liquids, or solids from containers to the Municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Barrington and/or the waters of the State so as to protect public health, safety and welfare. This pertains to any person who controls whether owned, leased, or operated, a refuse container or dumpster. Exceptions are: permitted temporary demolition containers, litter receptacles (other than dumpsters or other bulk containers), individual homeowner trash and recycling containers, refuse containers at facilities authorized to discharge stormwater under a valid NJPDES permit or large bulky items (e.g. furniture, bound carpet and padding, white goods placed outside for pick up). Please contact the DPW if you have any questions. Temporary demolition container permits are available at the Municipal Building Code Enforcement Office, please call the Code Enforcement Office if you have any questions.

From the Green Team DISPOSAL OF CFL BULBS

Most of you probably know about the energy and cost savings benefits to switching from incandescent light bulbs to compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs. CFLs on average use 60% - 80% less energy than their older counterparts and they last longer. CFLs have greatly improved since they first hit the market. Gone are the days of flickering and washed out lighting.

But what do you do when a bulb burns out or it breaks? Because CFLs contain a small amount of mercury sealed within the glass tubing, you need to know how to properly cleanup and dispose of a broken bulb to minimize mercury vapor exposure.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has developed best practices for cleanup and disposal for CFL bulbs. (See box below.) Since CFL's contain small amounts of mercury, they shouldn't be disposed of with your routine recycling or trash. You can

contact the store where you purchased it and inquire if they have a recycling program. Home Depot in Lawnside has a drop-off box for CFL bulbs at the Customer Service desk. You can also dispose of CFL's at the Camden County Hazardous Waste Collections that are scheduled throughout the year. For the County schedule, visit their website at www.camden-county.com. When delivering to the County waste collection events, put the bulb in a Ziploc bag. See the Recycler publication for key dates to recycle hazardous waste. Proper and responsible disposal will ensure that we keep mercury out of our landfills.

CFLs are an inexpensive way to "green" your home and save money. For more information, including steps you can take to prevent broken CFL bulbs, please visit the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency website at: <http://epa.gov/cfl/cflcleanup.html>.

EPA CLEANUP AND DISPOSAL OVERVIEW FOR CFL BULBS

To minimize exposure to mercury vapor, EPA recommends that residents follow the cleanup and disposal steps described below. This cleanup guidance represents the minimum actions recommended to clean up a broken CFL, and will be updated as EPA identifies more effective cleanup practices.

The most important steps to reduce exposure to mercury vapor from a broken bulb are:

1. Before cleanup
 - a. Have people and pets leave the room.
 - b. Air out the room for 5-10 minutes by opening a window or door to the outdoor environment.
 - c. Shut off the central forced air heating/air-conditioning system, if you have one.
 - d. Collect materials needed to clean up broken bulb:
 - stiff paper or cardboard;
 - sticky tape;
 - damp paper towels or disposable wet wipes (for hard surfaces); and
 - a glass jar with a metal lid or a sealable plastic bag.
2. During cleanup
 - a. **DO NOT VACUUM.** Vacuuming is not recommended unless broken glass remains after all other cleanup steps have been taken. Vacuuming could spread mercury-containing powder or mercury vapor.
 - b. Be thorough in collecting broken glass and visible powder. c. Place cleanup materials in a sealable container.
3. After cleanup
 - a. Promptly place all bulb debris and cleanup materials outdoors in a trash container or protected area until materials can be disposed of. Avoid leaving any bulb fragments or cleanup materials indoors.
 - b. If practical, continue to air out the room where the bulb was broken and leave the heating/air conditioning system shut off for several hours.

Our agency is a Barrington sponsored self-supported shared service agency that services the communities of Lawnside, Magnolia, Mt. Ephraim, Oaklyn and Hi-Nella as well as our own community. Not only do we provide Fire Code Enforcement for these communities, but we also assist the Fire Departments of these communities with fire investigations, as well as any fire safety related issues. As your representative in all of these neighboring communities you can be rest assured that we are up holding the upmost in public safety professionalism.

Now on with Fire Prevention:

With the help of the U.S. Fire Administration, a branch of FEMA, we would like to pass on some "Smoking Fire Safety". With our weather being as dry & hot as it has, we should all be aware of "Red

Flag Warnings" related to open burning and open flames as posted by the State.

As well as the fact that one careless disregard of any Smoking Material could lead to a major tragedy:

One in four people killed in home fires is not the smoker whose cigarette caused the fire:

- More than one-third of the victims are the children of the smokers.

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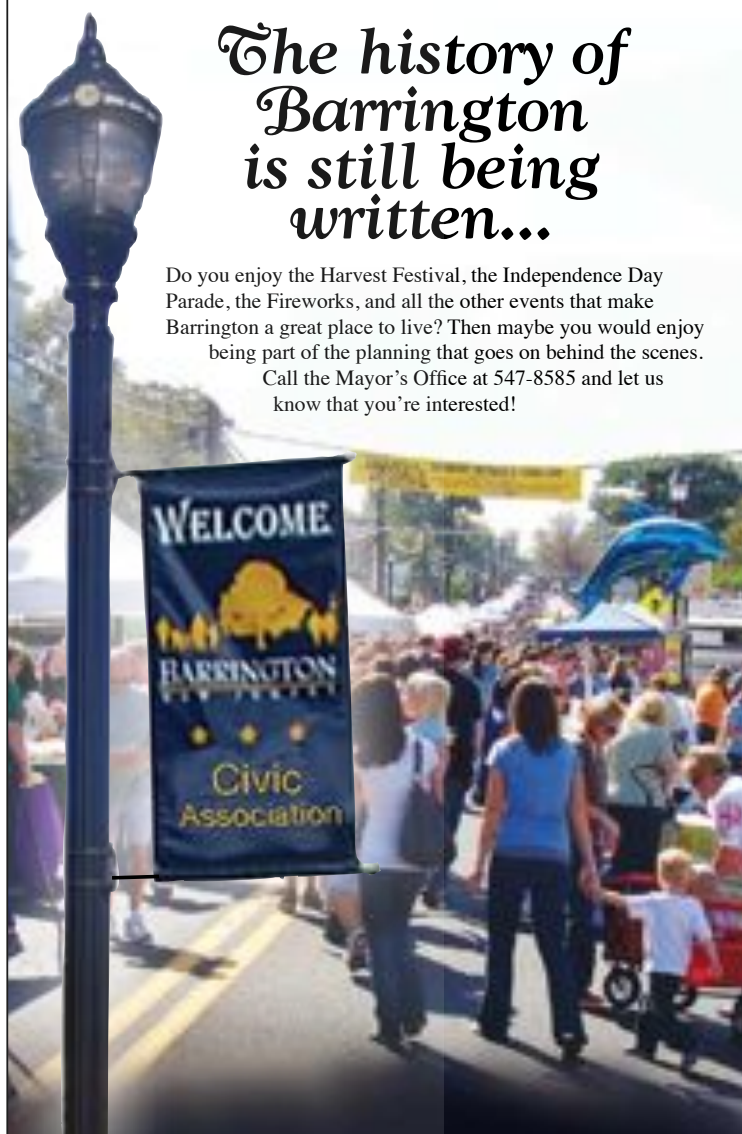

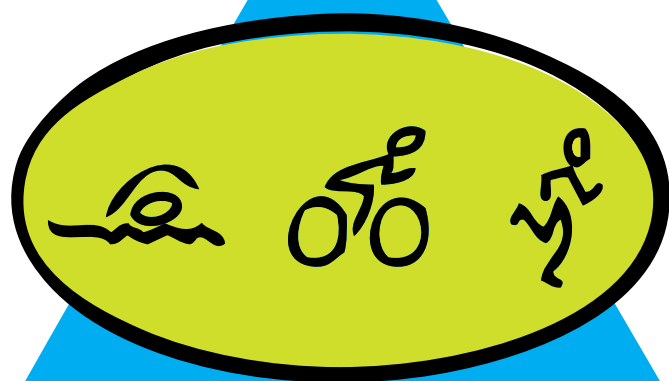

for high-school girls that not only featured hard-nosed skill and drill competition, but also placed emphasis on worship, prayer, and Bible study.

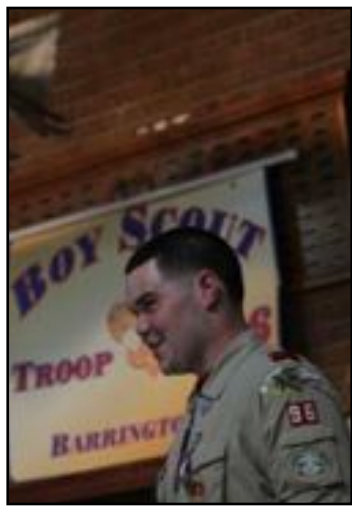
