Low Income Home Energy Assistance (LIHEAP) Program Now Accepting Applications The New Jersey Department of Community Affairs announces that the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is now accepting applications for the upcoming heating season, which runs from November 1, 2011 through April 30, 2012. The DCA administers this federal program, which provides low-income households with money to help pay their heating bills and makes provisions for emergency heating system services and emergency fuel assistance. The application can also be used to apply for the Universal Service Fund Program (USF), which is a statefunded initiative to help make natural gas and electric heating bills more affordable for lowincome households.

"During these tough economic times, many New Jersey households are still struggling to pay their bills. They shouldn't have to make a choice over whether to pay their heating bill or some other necessity, now that winter has arrived," said Governor Christie. "If heating is a concern this winter, families should take advantage of this invaluable program and submit their applications as soon as possible."

To be eligible for LIHEAP benefits, a household must be responsible for home heating, either directly or included in the rent, and have a gross income at or below 200% of the federal poverty level. To be eligible for USF benefits, a household must have a gross income at or below 175% of the federal poverty level, and pay more than 3% of its annual income

for electric or natural gas. If a household has electric heat, it must spend more than 6% of its annual income on electricity to be eligible. Assistance toward heating costs depends on income, household size, fuel type, and heating region.

For persons age 60 or older, or who are disabled, applications may be received and returned by mail.

BE PREPARED FOR WINTER WEATHER

As the winds outside turn blustery, it's time to make sure you are well prepared for winter disasters. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) offers the following tips for keeping safe and warm.

IN THE HOME:

- Prepare for possible isolation in your home by having sufficient heating fuel, regular fuel sources may be cut off. For example, store a good supply of dry, seasoned wood for your fireplace or wood burning stove.
- Extend the life of your fuel supply by insulating walls and attics, caulking and weather-stripping doors and windows, and installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic.
- Winterize your house, barn, shed or any other structure that may provide shelter for your family, neighbors, livestock or equipment. Clear rain gutters, repair roof leaks and cut away tree branches that could fall during a storm.
- Insulate pipes and allow faucets to drip a little during cold wether to avoid freezing
- Keep fire extinguishers on hand, and make sure everyone knows how to use them.

House fires pose an additional risk, as more people turn

to alternate heating sources without taking the necessary safety precautions.

- Learn how to shut off water valves (incase a pipe bursts).
- Know ahead of time what you should do to help elderly or disabled friends, neighbors or employees.
- Hire a contractor to check the structural ability of the roof to sustain unusually heavy weight from the accumulation of snow - or water - if drains do not work.

IN THE CAR:

- Check antifreeze levels. Ensure they are are sufficient to avoid freezing.
- Check battery and ignition system. It should be in top condition, and battery terminals should be clean.
- Check brakes. Inspect for wear and monitor fluid levels
- Check exhaust system. Look for leaks and crimped pipes and repair or replace as necessary. Carbon monoxide is deadly and usually gives no warning.
- Check fuel and air filters. Replace and keep water out of the system by using additives and maintaining a full tank of gas.
- Check heater and defroster. Ensure they work properly.

Check lights and flashing hazard lights. Check for serviceability.

- Check oil. Inspect level and weight. Heavier oils congeal more at low temperatures and do not lubricate as well
- Check thermostat. Ensure it works properly.
- Check windshield wiper equipment. Repair any problems and maintain proper washer fluid level.
- Install good winter tires. Make sure the tires have adequate tread. All-weather radials usually adequate for most winter conditions. However, some jurisdictions require that to drive on their roads, vehicles must be equipped with chains or snow tires with studs.
- Maintain at least a half tank of gas during the winter season.
- Place a winter emergency kit in each car that includes: a shovel windshield scraper small broom flashlight battery powered radio extra batteries water snack food matches extra hats socks and mittens blankets tow chain or rope road salt and sand booster cables emergency flares fluorescent distress flag necessary medications first aid kit (with a pocket knife)
