Independence Day Parade and Fireworks Dodge The Raindrops





Harvest Festival Scores Big Hit For 16th Time Around



It should have been no surprise that it rained for three days leading up to the Harvest Festival. It seemed like it had rained all summer.

The surprise was that, despite depressing weather forecasts all week, the morning of October 12th dawned with bright blue autumn skies and the Harvest Festival was on!

Although the forecast had prompted some vendors to sleep in, nearly 200 booths sprung up and the food trucks lit up their grills and ovens. Volunteers that have been running the Festival for many years have been joined by a fresh set of hands who have stepped up to help keep it going well into the future. By 10 am, everything was set up and running. Officials estimate that 10,000 people turned out to enjoy it.

There were blocks and blocks of arts and crafts, gifts, jewelry, food, kiddie rides, a wandering juggler on stilts, balloon animals, facepainting, and socializing galore. SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING AND TRASH HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

As everyone should be aware of by now you can commingle your plastics, aluminum and bottles together with your mixed paper into one container for pick up on Thursdays or you can continue to separate as you have always done. You can now also recycle #'s 4, 5, & 7 plastics along with your # 1 & 2 plastics. All other numbered plastics are not accepted. Due to the Thanksgiving Day holiday falling on a Thursday recycle pick up will be done the following day, Friday, 11/29 the same day as trash. Please separate your recycle containers from your trash containers so the crews can easily distinguish between the two for proper pick up.

Concrete and Stump holiday schedule – Due to Thanksgiving Day falling on a Thursday concrete and stump pickup will be on, Wednesday, 11/27, please call prior to the pickup day to be put on the schedule.

Scrap Metal holiday schedule – Due to Thanksgiving Day and Thanksgiving Day after, holiday falling on a Thursday and

Friday scrap metal pickup will be on, Wednesday, 11/27. Please call prior to the pickup day to be put on the schedule.

Bagged and Containerized leaf holiday schedule – Due to Thanksgiving Day holiday falling on a Thursday bagged and containerized leaf pickup will be on Wednesday, 11/27.

Brush holiday schedule – Due to Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and President's Day falling on a Monday brush pickup will be the following day, Tuesday 1/20 and Tuesday 2/17/2014.

RECYCLING NEWS

VEGETATIVE WASTE/ LEAVES During the winter months from January until the end of March, the DPW will continue to do courtesy bagged or containerized pick ups weather and manpower permitting on Thursdays. This type of waste is recyclable and costs less to dispose of as compared to being disposed of as trash waste and is much more GREEN and environmentally responsible. If you can, please wait until the spring regular pick up schedule resumes to put out. There will also be a loose-leaf pick up week that will occur again in the spring of 2014.

Brush Year round pick up performed on Mondays. Tree limbs and trimmings, brush with roots removed and stumps no larger than twelve inches in diameter with all dirt washed off. Stumps in excess of twelve inches in diameter must arrange for a special pick up which is performed on Thursdays by calling the DPW prior to Thursday to be put on a pick up list. Any tree removals performed by a contractor and/or homeowner is the responsibility of the contractor and/or homeowner to arrange for disposal of

all resulting debris. The DPW will not pick up any debris resulting from the above mentioned.

SCRAP METAL Over the past few years the Borough has seen a steady decline in our recycling rate for scrap metal due to scavengers. In an effort to curb scavengers residents are asked to wait until the morning of pickup to put your items to the curb, you can also bring your scrap metal items to the DPW yard Monday thru Friday during normal business hours, 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., for disposal in our scrap metal dumpster or if you can contact the DPW ahead of time we may be able to make arrangements for pick up prior to your regularly scheduled pick up date if our schedule and manpower allows. By increasing our scrap metal recycling rate the Borough will receive increased revenue shares, increase our overall recycling rate which will increase our recycling grant funding because it is based on how much you recycle and help in achieving the State goal of recycling 50% of our solid waste stream Statewide. In 2012 the Borough residential recycling rate was 57.17%.

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

Residents can bring their E-Waste to the DPW yard for disposal. Hours for drop off are Monday thru Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The following items can be disposed of as E-Waste:

- Any and All Related Computer Parts
- Phones, Cell Phones, Cell Phone and Laptop Batteries
- PC Scrap and Stereos (No Wood)
- VCR's, DVD's, CD Players and Boom Boxes
- Any Audio and Visual Equipment
- Scanners and Pagers
- Cash registers and Scales (Electronic or Mechanical)
- Rechargeable Batteries
- Household Appliances Not Containing Compressors
- Televisions

As of January 1, 2011, it is now mandatory to recycle covered electronic devices according to State Law entitled "The Electronic Waste Management Act". The Borough of Barrington DPW began accepting electronics in 2010 and recycled 3.30 tons for the year, 10.61 tons in 2011, 19.38 tons in 2012 and 11.41 tons so far in 2013. If residents have electronic items such as televisions that are too heavy or burdensome to drop off to the DPW please call and we will we make special arrangements to pick up. Please be advised that any electronic items put to the curb for trash will not be picked up. SIDEWALK SNOW & ICE REMOVAL MAINTENANCE

Borough Ordinance requires that all homeowners and business owners remove snow and ice from the public sidewalks bordering their properties within (12) hours of daylight after snow and ice have formed. Don't be caught unprepared as storms come up quickly.

Get your shovels and ice melt now and give the snow blower a start up so you are ready for old man winter.

SNOW REMOVAL

With winter fast approaching and the possibility of snow, residents need to be aware of several things. If your street is designated as a snow emergency route, which is sign posted no vehicles shall be parked on either side of the street once snow has accumulated and until snow has ceased and roads are plowed sufficiently to allow parking without being a hazard. If at all possible please park your vehicle off street even if your street is not an emergency route, this will allow for a more efficient snow removal job. Also the following streets are County Roads and are the responsibility of the County, Clements Bridge Road (CR573), Gloucester Pike (CR659), Atlantic Avenue (CR727), Highland Avenue (CR573), Warwick Road (CR669), Hutchinson Avenue (CR665), Copley Road (CR666), 3rd Avenue (CR653), if you have any complaints please direct them to the Camden County Dept. of Public Works at 566-2980.

The following roads are State highways and are the responsibility of the NJDOT, I-295 and the White Horse Pike (SR30), if you have any complaints please direct them to the NJDOT maintenance yard at 486-6600.

Again this year the DPW will be treating the roads with regular salt and/or treated salt only. Also, the Borough again will not be entering into a shared services agreement this winter season with the Camden County Dept. of Public Works to assist them in snowplowing and treating the County roads. BARRINGTON STARTS T-N-R PROGRAM

A group of concerned citizens have formed a Trap-Neuter-Return (T-N-R) program in Barrington. You may have seen our table at the Harvest Fest. The mission of the T-N-R Program is to trap feral and stray cats, have them neutered and vaccinated and return them to the area where they were found. In recent years, the Camden County Animal Shelter has euthanized tens of thousands of cats because feral and stray cats are such a problem throughout the County. Obviously killing cats is not something anyone wants to do. T-N-R Programs are a humane and very effective alternative.

Trapping cats and removing them does not work. Research shows that new cats just move in because there is a food

source. Neutering the cats DOES work. In Gloucester City, the town had a huge problem with feral cats down near the river. They endorsed and supported an aggressive T-N-R Program and the feral cat population was reduced by 40% in only three years. T-N-R works—similar evidence exists all across the country and overseas as well.

We have partnered with the CSTAR Animal Care program. CSTAR holds monthly SOS (Spay our Strays) Clinics where for only \$35.00, they will neuter/spay, vaccinate and ear tip a feral cat (ear tipping involves cutting the tip of the cat's ear so they can easily be identified as already being neutered). We need volunteers! We need help with trapping, taking cats to the clinics and recovery until the cats can be released. If you would like

There are other ways to help too. We can always use donations, either of supplies or of money. We can use cat food—both wet and dry—for the cats that are being fostered during recovery. We can use monetary donations to help with the costs of neutering. Anything you can do to help will be greatly appreciated.

295 CONSTRUCTION LEAVING SOME HOMELESS

With the onset of construction on Rte. 295, the project has taken over properties for the expansion of the highway. While the expansion and extension has affected many property owners, it is also affecting the natural habitat of wildlife native to the areas adjacent to the highway. Drainage areas along the highway corridor have long been the home for various species with wooded havens for shelter and fresh water availability. Marsupials, ground hogs, squirrels, and other rodents (mice and rats) have long made these areas their home. In addition, the mild winter of this past year has increased activity and their population.

The construction has caused many of these natural areas to be disturbed to provide for the required expansion of storm water collection areas needed to handle the additional runoff. This disturbance has caused many of these animals to seek somewhere new to reside. With no-

where else to go, some are seeking refuge in now residential areas of local towns. They are finding refuge under sheds, wood piles and overgrown hedges or shrubs. Some will actually seek shelter in crawl spaces, if access is available.

While none of this wildlife is desirable in residential settings, they will harbor and make a home if the ingredients for easy survival are available. Listed below are some things you can do to insure your home and property doesn't become theirs.

- Seal off any and all penetrations in your foundation walls. The smallest of opening can provide access for field mice. Cable wire penetrations should be sealed, foundation vents should be secured or replaced, and cracks should be repaired.

- Seal any space in or under a garden shed that could provide safe haven for nesting, and protection from the elements.

- Clear out gardening areas now that the growing season is finished, and remove piles of leaves or branches.

- Keep lids on trash cans, and recycling containers as open containers can provide an easy food source, making your property a desirable stop.

- Keep firewood stored above ground and away from your dwelling.

- If you have a pet, clean up after them daily. Whether or not you believe it, one animal's excrement can be another's dinner. As gross as this seems, animal feces is a prime attractor of rodents.

If you find evidence of rodent infestation, contact an exterminator immediately, especially if you believe they might be present in your home or crawl space. They have environmentally safe methods of baiting and poisoning. Do not bait the exterior of your property

as the bait is initially an attractant that could draw more attention to your property, as well as being harmful to domestic pets. The best methods to insure your home doesn't become theirs are to follow the guidelines listed above. If you remove the necessities for their survival SHELTER, FOOD, and WATER they will go elsewhere to find them.

PREPARING FOR SNOW REMOVAL

While last winter was unusually mild with little or no snow accumulation, this winter is expected to be quite different. The following is a list of tips to both ease your burden and advise everyone of the Borough requirements regarding snow.

Obviously no parking is allowed on "Snow Emergency Routes". If you are not sure if your street is a designated route please contact either the Police or Public Works Departments for clarification.

Pull all vehicles in the driveway as tight as possible to each other and tight to one side of the driveway where you would pile your shoveled snow. Use a soft bristled "push broom" to clear all snow off your vehicle right to your lawn. With two vehicles you now have 30-40 feet of your driveway already cleared.

Start your vehicle after broom cleaning, with your defrosters on high. Shovel your apron and behind your vehicles BEFORE moving them. This will prevent you from having to shovel hard packed snow that will eventually freeze. Clear off any small amounts of snow remaining on the vehicle.

Plows will now be able to pass straight runs along the curb line quicker getting more streets done in less time and providing you curbside parking to finish the remaining side of the driveway not previously covered by your vehicles.

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
