

**2011 RECYCLING TONNAGE GRANT**

The Borough received a grant in the amount \$44,940.26. This is in part due to an increased effort to get the commercial sector to report their recycling statistics to the Borough and an increased effort on the part of enforcement to get the business sector to comply with recycling regulations. The combined recycling tonnage totals for both residential and commercial are reported to the NJDEP every year by law and the statistics are used as part of the grant program to determine grant amounts. The grant monies can be used for recycling related costs such as disposal costs, recycle containers, recycling equipment, salaries, etc.

**STREETLIGHTS**

If you should notice a light out, all ways on, flickering, broken or missing parts you can report to PSE&G customer service at 1-800-436-7734. You will need to obtain the pole # which is usually located at about eye level on a metal label attached to the wooden poles or at the base of the black metal streetcape poles. You will also need to provide street address and nearest cross street. If you prefer you can always call DPW to report and we will contact PSE&G.

**STREET SWEEPER**

The goal of the Dept. is to sweep the whole town two to three times a year. Once in the early Spring, once in the late Spring and/or early Summer and once in the late Summer. We will advertise on the Borough website, cable channels 19/33 and post signs in your district the week prior. In order to provide a more efficient job, residents will need to move their cars off the street on your scheduled week. Every effort will be made to stay on schedule by delays can happen due to manpower, breakdowns, weather, etc. First sweep will be as follows: District 1 week of June 2nd, District 2 week of June 9th and District 3 week of June 16th.

**TEXTILE DONATIONS**

The Borough has (2) textile donation containers, (1) located at the Borough Hall parking lot and (1) located at the entrance gate to the DPW. Residents may drop off clothes, shoes, blankets, draperies, sheets, and any other type of textiles. Please do not drop off any items that are contaminated, meaning items that are wet, soiled, etc. Items other than those mentioned

are not acceptable. Put your items in the container do not leave on the ground outside the container.

**DIG SAFELY**

Homeowners are reminded that prior to any type of excavation work you are required to call the New Jersey One Call Center at 1-800-272-1000 or 811 to request a mark out of all underground utilities. This is the law in New Jersey and is for your safety. Examples of excavation could be but are not limited to landscaping, irrigation systems, fencing installations, concrete work, etc. If you have a contractor doing your work the contractor should be aware of this requirement also. If you see colored flags on your property, these are colored flags on your property, these are utility markings. Yellow= gas, Red = Electric, Orange = Communication/CATV, Blue = Water, Green = Sanitary Sewer, White = Proposed excavation area.

**HOLIDAY SCHEDULE THRU JULY**

- MEMORIAL DAY** - May 26th (Monday) - DPW closed. All services rescheduled for the following day.
- INDEPENDENCE DAY** - July 4th (Friday) - DPW closed. Trash pickup will be rescheduled for the following day Saturday July 5th. Scrap metal pickup will be performed a day earlier on Thursday July 3rd.

**STORMWATER PROGRAM REGULATIONS**

**CONTAINERIZED YARD WASTE:** Per ordinance #813 - Prohibited conduct - The owner or occupant of any property, or any employee or contractor of such owner or occupant engaged to provide lawn care or landscaping services, shall not sweep, rake blow or otherwise place yard waste, unless the yard waste is containerized, in the street. If yard waste that is not containerized is placed in the street, the party

responsible for placement of yard waste must remove the yard waste from the street or said party shall be deemed in violation of this ordinance.

**PRIVATE STORM DRAIN RETROFITTING:**

Per ordinance #933 - property owners must retrofit existing storm drain inlets which are in direct contact with repaving, repairing, reconstruction, or resurfacing or alterations of facilities on private property, to prevent the discharge of solids and floatables (such as plastic bottles, cans, food wrappers and other litter) to the municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Barrington so as to protect public health, safety and welfare. If you are performing any of the above mentioned items you will need to meet the new storm drain inlet design standards. Please contact the DPW if you have any questions.

**REFUSE CONTAINERS/DUMPSTERS:**

Per ordinance #933 - requires dumpsters and other refuse containers that are outdoors or exposed to storm water to be covered at all times, and prohibits the spilling, dumping or leaking, or otherwise discharge of liquids, semi-liquids, or solids from containers to the Municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Barrington and/or the waters of the State so as to protect public health, safety and welfare. This pertains to any person who controls whether owned, leased, or operated, a refuse container or dumpster. Exceptions are: permitted temporary demolition containers, litter receptacles (other than dumpster or other bulk containers), individual homeowner trash and recycling containers, refuse containers at facilities authorized to discharge storm water under a valid NJPDES permit or large bulky items (e.g. furniture, bound carpet and padding, white goods placed outside for pick up). Please contact the DPW if you have any questions. Temporary demolition container permits are available at the Municipal Building Code Enforcement Office, please call the Code Enforcement Office if you have any questions, 547-0706.

**HAZARDOUS WASTE**

Items such as propane tanks, car batteries, oil based paints, etc. are considered hazardous and cannot be disposed of in the trash. The Camden County Department of Environmental Affairs sponsors household collection disposal drop off sites throughout the County during the year. For more information please contact the CCDEA at 858-5241.

**CAR BATTERIES:** Can be disposed of at most local auto part stores for a nominal fee or can be disposed of at Camden County Hazardous waste drop off sites. For dates and times please call the CCDEA at 856-858-5241. Do not put curbside for recycling or trash pickup, it will not be picked up.

### Barrington Drug Alliance

The Barrington Drug Alliance would first like to thank Mrs. Barbara Hanson for her many years of service to the Alliance. Mrs. Hanson decided to retire from her position as Alliance Coordinator this Spring. Thank you Mrs. Hanson, for all you have done for the Barrington Community!

The Barrington Alliance has made it a priority to improve communication and collaboration between the Barrington school students and staff and the Borough and its programs. In order to do this, a new coordinator, who works for the school district has been selected. Mrs. Kristin Flowers, the new Alliance Coordinator will now manage the Drug Alliance Program and work with

community partners such as The Teen Center, DARE Program and Project Prom to utilize grant funds in a way that best serves the Barrington students and community. Mrs. Flowers is excited to be working in this new role, and her goal is to increase the amount of student, parent, and teacher participation with the Drug Alliance Program.

In the spring of 2014, the Alliance funded the Red Ribbon Week campaign. A fun-filled week focused on providing anti-drug education and activities to the students at both Avon and Woodland Schools. The Alliance also continued to help fund the DARE program at Woodland and The Barrington Teen Center and Project Prom. The Barrington Drug Alliance looks forward to providing more programs to the school and community the Fall.

### Camden County Needs Domestic Violence Response Teams

In 2011, Camden County saw more than 6,500 incidents of domestic violence that resulted in the arrest of an abuser. These incidents included homicide, physical and sexual assaults, kidnapping, and harassment. Since many incidents of domestic violence go unre-

ported or without an arrest, it is likely that these numbers are actually higher.

The experience of being a victim of domestic violence is isolating and confusing. But, throughout the county, there are community-based Domestic Violence Response Teams (DVRTs), made up of volunteers who meet victims of domestic violence at the police station and provide support, encouragement, and resources, so that vic-

tims don't feel so alone.

The Camden County Women's Center is looking for more volunteers to join DVRTs across the county.

To volunteer on the DVRT, a 40-hour training must be completed. Two different training classes are held during the year and scheduled two evenings/week for three hours/night and runs for seven weeks. The class is free of charge. Participants will learn about the dynamics

of power and control in relationships, the profile of a batterer, the effects of domestic violence on children, the police department's response to, and the laws concerning domestic violence, as well as other relevant topics.

## Business Spotlight
