

Caucus and Council meetings begin at 6:00pm and all meetings include open public portions where will the public will be heard on any subject. Agendas are posted to the website 24 hours before the meeting. Meetings are in-person and will be at Borough Hall. All agendas, resolutions and ordinances are on the borough website under "Government", then click on "Council Business". Also, did you know our Borough Code is online? Just click on the green button on the home page of the website to see our full code. Only ordinances adopted this year are not included. They are sent to the publisher in January and then added to the online code. But the ordinances adopted this year are available under Council Business. Again, the borough website is www.barringtonboro.com.

Borough Hall is open for borough business and hours are 8:30am-4:00pm, Monday-Thursday, and 8:30am-noon on Fridays. Staff can also be reached by phone or by email. The contact directory is on the website under "About Barrington", then "Phone/Email Directory".

You can make tax and sewer payments online by check, credit card or debit card. Please visit the borough website at www.barringtonboro.com and click on the red button that says "Pay Tax/Sewer Bills Online". The website will let you know the fee for making an online payment. FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

RECYCLING: Businesses and Residents are required by State law, County and Local Regulations to Recycle. Recycling is good for our Environment and Saves Tax dollars as it reduces trash tonnage. If you need a recycling container, they are available at Public Works or the Tax office. Copies of Trash and Recycling Collection Schedule and Regulations are on the Borough website under Public Works.

VEGETATIVE WASTE PICK UP: Vegetative waste is collected on Monday. Vegetative waste is defined as grass clippings, sticker balls, acorns, pinecones and viny type materials such as ivy, honey suckle, poison ivy, and plant clippings. Vegetative waste can be put in 20-gallon containers not weighing more than 50lbs.-- please no dirt or sod. Plastic trash bags CANNOT be used for veggie waste. The brown kraft bags from Home Depot and Lowes can be used for veggie waste.

SCRAP METAL: Scrap metal is collected on Fridays and must be called into the DPW Office prior to Friday by calling 547-2486 ext.105. Scrap metal can also be dropped-off at the DPW yard Monday thru Friday during normal business hours, 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., for disposal in our scrap metal dumpster. If you contact the DPW ahead of time, we may be able to make arrangements for pick-up prior to your regularly scheduled pick-up day if our schedule and manpower allows.

TIRES - RESIDENTIAL: (2) tires per week per household, must be off the rims and can be put to curb for trash pickup. If tires are on the rims they will not be picked up.

CONRETE: Concrete is picked-up on Thursdays in small amounts. Pick up by the Borough must be called into the DPW office prior to Thursday by calling 547-2486 ext. 105. If you or a Contractor are replacing your sidewalk and/or driveway or any other type of renovation work, you will need to arrange for private disposal. Please remember concrete work requires a permit and sometimes a street opening permit if you're doing curb work, please contact the Code Enforcement Office if you should have any questions at 547-0706. Ext.206.

BRUSH PICK UP: Brush pick-up is on Mondays including tree limbs and trimmings, brush with roots removed and stumps not more than twelve (12) inches in diameter. Brush, limbs and stumps should be no longer than 4ft. and stacked neatly curbside so not to protrude into the street or block the sidewalk. If stumps are more than 12" in diameter, call the DPW office for special pick-up prior to Thursday. Any tree work done by a Contractor is the responsibility of the Contractor to dispose of debris. Do not place brush, limbs, stumps, in the street, as this is a dangerous practice that may cause a liability problem. Due to the heavy volume your pick up may not be completed on your scheduled pick up day--just leave at the curb and it will be picked up the following day.

WOODEN FENCING AND RAILROAD

TIES: The Borough provides a pickup of small amounts that should be no longer than 4' and limited to no more than 10 pieces per week. Pick up by the Borough is on Fridays and is to be put curbside for trash pickup. If a Contractor is doing the work the Contractor is responsible for disposing of the debris

WASTE OIL: Motor waste oil only may be brought to the Public Works Garage Monday-Friday 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Do not drop off after hours and leave at gate. Proof of residency required.

TRASH AND RECYCLING: Must be placed For the complete list of electronic items that are curbside by 6:00 a.m. on the day of collection but no sooner than 1:00 p.m. the day preceding collection. A copy of the trash and recycling regulations is online at www.barringtonboro.com. Please remember to secure your trash properly. Trash blows all over town on windy days.

TRASH - MOVE OUTS, ESTATES AND VACANT HOMES: frequently these type of properties are problems because the Resident/ Tenant, Family or Property Maintenance Company think that they can throw the house to the curb. This is not acceptable and is not in compliance with Borough Ordinances and/or Regulations. The trash must be put in trash containers and/or Contractor grade trash bags and all recyclables must be source separated and put out on the appropriate recycling day in compliance with Recycling Regulations. If the amount of trash is not a normal residential pick up private disposal must be provided. If you see this type of problem in your neighborhood or if you have any questions please call the DPW.

CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS: Homeowner's are limited to five (5) containers per week. Please do not pile debris at the curb because it will not be picked up unless it is in a container. If you are remodeling yourself or using a private Contractor and will be in excess of the amount described herein, you will need to arrange for private disposal.

SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING:

COMMINGLE: Includes empty unbroken glass: empty aluminum tin and/or bi-metal food and beverages containers, empty plastic juice, soda, water, milk, and/or laundry detergent bottles with the number 1 or 2 symbols on the bottom. Nothing other than 1's or 2's can be recycled. Labels may be left on but plastic caps should be discarded.

MIXED PAPERS: Includes newspapers, magazines, catalogs, envelops, junk mail, school papers, work books, textbook (without covers) office paper, non-metallic wrapping paper and computer printout papers and cardboard.

The above single stream items can be placed all together in one yellow recycling container or you can continue to separate by placing commingle in recycling container, mixed paper and newspaper in a brown bag, corrugated cardboard by flattening and bundling. Yellow 32 gal. recycling containers are available at the Borough Hall. All items will ultimately be mixed together when picked up by Contractor and thrown into recycling truck. Place items curbside the night before collection but no earlier than 1:00 p.m. the day preceding collection to ensure that you're recycling will be picked up. Do not place your recycling in the street as this is a dangerous practice that may cause a liability problem. Recycling placed on the park strip will not harm the grass. The above single stream recycling is collected by South Jersey Sanitation. If your recycling was not collected or there is a problem please call South Jersey Sanitation at 609-561-0441 or call the Department of Public Works at 547-2486 ext. 105. Only the items mentioned above are acceptable. Please do not contaminate, this causes operational problems at the Recycling Facility.

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING: Effective immediately residents can bring their E-waste to the DPW yard for disposal with an appointment only by calling 856-547-2486 Ext.105. Hours for dropoff are Monday thru Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. to be recycled, visit the Borough website at www. barringtonboro.com, then Borough Services, Public

2019 RECYCLING TONNAGE GRANT: The Borough received a grant in the amount \$9,028.64. The combined recycling tonnage totals for both residential and commercial are reported to the NJDEP every year by law and the statistics are used as part of the grant program to determine grant amounts. The grant monies can be used for recycling related costs such as disposal costs, recycle containers, recycling equipment, salaries, etc.

STREETLIGHTS: If you notice a light out, please call DPW and we will report it to PSE&G. We will need to know the location (pole number) of the pole. You can also call in to PSE&G at 1-800-436-7734.

HAZARDOUS WASTE: Items such as propane tanks, car batteries, oil-based paints, etc. are considered hazardous and cannot be disposed of in the trash. The Camden County Department of Environmental Affairs sponsors household collection disposal drop off sites throughout the County during the year. For more information, please contact the CCDEA at 856-858-5241.

CAR BATTERIES: Can be disposed of at most local auto part stores for a nominal fee or can be disposed of at Camden County Hazardous waste drop off sites. For dates and times please call the CCDEA at 856-858-5241. Do not put curbside for recycling or trash pickup--it will not be picked up.

STREET SWEEPER: The goal is to sweep the whole town twice a year. Once in early spring and again in late spring/early summer. We will post on the Borough website, Facebook and will also post signs in your district the week prior. Please keep cars off the street as it allows us to do a thorough job. First sweep is as follows: District 1-week of May 23; District 2—week of May 30; and District 3 week of June 6. Delays can happen but we will try to stick to that schedule.

DIG SAFELY: Homeowners are reminded that prior to any type of excavation work you are required to call the New Jersey One Call Center at 1-800-272-1000 or 811 to request a mark out of all underground utilities. Examples of excavation include landscaping, irrigation systems, fencing installations, concrete work, etc. If you have a Contractor doing your work the Contractor should be aware of this requirement also. If you see colored paint markings in the road or colored flags on your property, these are utility markings. Yellow = Gas, Red = Electric, Orange = Communication/CATV, Blue = Water, Green = Sanitary Sewer, White = Proposed excavation area.

This newsletter explains what you can do to help with stormwater pollution. Our direct and indirect actions contribute to the problem and we can all help to reduce stormwater pollution. The NJDEP requires all municipalities to have a Municipal Stormwater Regulation Program. The flip side of this letter provides details on how you can help comply with this program. Cleaning up pet waste, limiting use of fertilizers and pesticides and helping to keep debris out of stormwater inlets are just some of the things residents can do to help reduce pollution. The Borough installed markers on stormwater inlets that read "No Dumping-Drains to River" and installed inlet covers that help prevent certain solids and floatables from reaching the surface waters. We also periodically street-sweep our roads to help keep pollution from flowing into the inlets. All of these actions help to reduce stormwater pollution. Please take the time to read this newsletter to see what you can do to help. Pet Waste Pollutes Our Waters

Did you know that animal waste from pets can pollute our waters? When left on the ground, pet waste is washed by rain and melting snow and ice into storm drains that carry it to our rivers, lakes, the ocean and drinking water. Animal waste contains a high concentration of nutrients as well as bacteria and disease causing microorganisms that can cause problems.

What you can do

Pet owners, or anyone who takes your pet for walks, must properly dispose of the waste by picking it up, wrapping it and placing it in the trash or flushing it unwrapped down the toilet. Barrington is required to adopt and enforce local pet waste laws. At a minimum, we must require that pet owners or their keepers immediately and properly dispose of their pet's solid waste deposited on any public or private property not owned or possessed by that person. People with service animals such as Seeing Eye dogs are exempt. Please make sure you are familiar with the Borough Ordinance and follow it. Thank you for helping to keep New Jersey's waters clean.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean, rivers and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings; you name it, and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water and that's why we're all doing something

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. The steps we take now will result in cleaner water and will save on the high cost of cleaning-up our water.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident, business or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides.

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- · Look for alternatives to pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers & pesticides, follow the instructions on the label to correctly apply it.
- Properly use and dispose of hazardous products.
- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated. These drains are marked with the "No Dumping" markers.
- · Clean-up after your pet.
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- · Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipal or county offices for the locations of hazardous waste disposal facilities.
- Do not let sewage or other waste flow into a stormwater system.
- Do not feed wildlife such as ducks and geese.
- Do not litter. Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- · Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly.

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains. Do not blow grass clippings or leaves into the street.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

With the nicer weather approaching please use caution when utilizing grills, check for winter nests that were made in small areas before lighting, always use grills away from any structures with at least a ten-foot perimeter. Please always keep an extinguisher or hose close by when utilizing fire pits. Please check pool gates for working locks to

avoid small children accessing pools unattended. Please feel free to reach out to us about more safety tips to keep your summer activities exciting and safe!

Have you checked your smoke detectors recently? Have you heard that low battery chirp so long that you do not even notice it? It is especially important to have working smoke detectors throughout your home! Yes, it is important that the basement have a working smoke detector! 2,900 dryer fires are reported each year causing an estimated 5 deaths, 100 injuries and over \$35 million dollars in property damage!!!! 34% of these fires are due to failure to clean the dryer lint! Make sure to empty your dryer lint after each use.

Barrington Fire Company and The Regional Fire Prevention Alliance have teamed up with 6ABC and Kiddie for their 2022 6ABC Operation-Save-A Life. This campaign donates smoke detectors to fire companies to install free of charge to homes that need new working smoke detectors or to replace damaged non-working detectors. Even medical insurance companies only pay a fraction of the cost to operate the ambulance. Ambulance associations all across the country are struggling with the rapidly escalating operating costs and increased labor costs. Yet Medicare and insurance companies are not paying nearly their fair share of the cost.

Please remember that ambulances are for true emergencies. For non-emergencies you should go to an urgent care facility or your family doctor. If all you need is a ride, you should call Uber, Lyft or a taxi service.

Historical Society

We'll continue that walk with that little girl from a couple of issues ago. Now she's older and can walk to places on her own. There's school, of course, at Culbertson, where Rite Aid is now. On her way home, she can stop at Ed & Ben's Gas Station to buy penny candy. The variety of candy to choose from seems endless: Mary Jane's, pretzel sticks, licorice sticks, dots on paper strips, wax lips,

Bubble gum, candy cigarettes and more-all for one penny each and placed in small brown paper bag. There was also Mrs. Purnell's, on the corner of Gloucester Pike and Trenton, where sodas and more could be purchased. Or the girl would ask her mom for six cents so she could purchase a delicious cream donut at the Collmont Bakery, 421 Clement's Bridge Road, now a private home.

Roden's 5&10 at 208 Clement's Bridge Road was a magical place it seemed to the girl. It sold candy bars, Hershey's and Bonomo's Turkish Taffy, toys, and lots of other goods. She would buy Christmas presents here for her family-powder puffs for Mom, handkerchiefs for Dad, a toy dog for her sister. On one side of the brick building was the post office, the Mary Happ Shop, which sold baby and women's clothes on the other side. She went to Brownie meetings in the basement of the old Methodist Church and to the dentist, Dr. Luis, which is now Heart and Soul Farmhouse but with her mother and sister. Lou Tessitore's Luncheonette, known as the Triangle, was a great place for a good burger. Her mother would give her money to buy lunch there all by herself. It was just up the street from her house and is now Chef's Commissary Kitchen.

The library was in the old Borough Hall, demolished in the mid 70's, across the street from her house. She went there often, going through the children's books, checking many out to take home. Mrs. Githens was the librarian for many years. The Borough Hall was like a playground to the girl who played on the metal front porch railings.

Now that the girl is grown up & many years older, she's glad she lived in Barrington where there were so many places to go in the mid 1950s.

-))) Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
-))) The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
-))) Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
-))) Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
-))) Never leave your grill unattended.
-))) Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS


-))) There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
-))) If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
-))) Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
-))) There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least 5 minutes before re-lighting it.



- (!) July is the peak month for grill fires.
- Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.
