A regular monthly Council Meeting of the Borough of Barrington was held with Mayor Hanson presiding.

# **CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Hanson called the meeting to order with the following statement: "This meeting is held in compliance with Chapter 231 of the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975 and appropriate notice has been given. Notice of the meeting was filed with the Retrospect and Courier Post and is also posted in the main office of the Borough Clerk where notices are primarily kept.

#### **ROLL CALL**

The Municipal Clerk called roll of Council with the following in attendance: Council President Beach, Councilman Beyer, Councilman Cerrito, Councilman Drumm, Councilwoman Mercado-Miller and Councilman Robenolt. Mayor Hanson, Municipal Clerk Terry Shannon, and Solicitor Timothy Higgins were also on the dais.

# <u>APPROVAL OF MINUTES</u>

Mayor Hanson reported that council was provided with the minutes of June 3, 2025, caucus, and June 11, 2025, council meetings and asked if there were any corrections or abstentions. On a motion by Beyer, second by Drumm, the minutes were approved with all members present in favor with Councilman Beach abstaining on the Caucus minutes and Councilman Robenolt abstaining on the Council minutes.

Mayor Hanson reported that the monthly departmental reports were distributed to the governing body, and are posted outside of council chambers, and are posted on the borough website. If there are no questions on the reports, I will entertain a motion to accept monthly reports. On a motion by Drumm, second by Mercado-Miller, the public hearing on these ordinances was opened.

Dolores Banks from Reading Avenue— has concerns about the ADU ordinance and current reports about climate change and now the ADU ordinance will affect storm water damage. She understands the reasoning behind the ordinance but has problems with stormwater now, this could make it worse. Neighbors have sump pumps pumping water into street and it ends at her street and comes on her property. She is concerned that allowing people to build additional structures on their property will make the stormwater problems in Barrington worse.

Joe Tursi – agrees with Mrs. Banks about the drainage problems. What are your current plans to address this water drainage problem? Also, wants to know the reason the ordinance for cannabis facilities was dropped from 1000 to 200 feet. Drug Free School Zones are 1000 feet from schools so why would you allow cannabis facilities within 200 feet?

With reference to water drainage issues, Councilman Beach advised that he drives the streets after storms and Public Works has addressed a lot of these problems by clearing drainage areas, and replacing grates on stormwater inlets. Mr. Tursi also questioned the work being done by DOT along 295 and Mayor Hanson responded they are doing their own clearing of the stormwater pipes under 295 and across the Pike.

Mayor Hanson advised that the paving on Third Ave will tie into the Reading Avenue situation and more draining improvements will be included. At our level we are doing all we can. He said that council will be glad to meet with the neighbors and our engineers to discuss potential solutions.

Council President Beach made a motion to table Ordinances 1211 and 1212 until the August meeting so they could be discussed further, which was seconded by Councilman Beyer and approved with the following poll vote: Beach-yes, Beyer-yes, Cerrito-yes, Drumm-yes, Mercado-Miller-yes, Robenolt-yes. Ordinances 1211 and 1212 were tabled.

Seeing no further comments from the public, on a motion by Robenolt, second by Drumm, the public hearing on the ordinances was closed.

Mayor Hanson advised that if you have comments or questions, please come forward and state your name for the record. Public comment is limited to five minutes per person. On a motion by Drumm, second by Beyer, the public portion of the meeting was opened.

Kristen Lampe - the rain garden keeps water out of the street and in the ground. She also asked about Ord 1211 and the change from 1000 feet to 200 feet. Mayor Hanson advised that since that ordinance was tabled it will be discussed at our August caucus meeting which is open to the public.

Mr. Tursi thinks this is not a good area for the rain garden, it exacerbates the problem in the area, and he would like to see the report that was prepared by Pennoni on the drainage study. Clerk Shannon said the report is on our website already. Flooding condition problems were further discussed by Mr. Tursi.

Seeing no further comments from the public, on a motion by Drumm, second by Mercado-Miller, the public portion of the meeting was closed.

The Barrington Seniors are open every Tuesday and Thursday from noon-4pm on the second floor of the borough hall. Their July casino trip is already sold out; they will have a Christmas in July movie on July 17 at 12:30pm, please come out and bring a friend. The Mayor's Wellness Campaign was just completed with a "Wellness Week." If you would like to get involved, please come to our Mayor's Wellness Campaign meeting at the borough hall, Thursday at 5pm.
