MINUTES OF MONTHLY COUNCIL MEETING
September 9, 2025, 6:00PM
COUNCIL ROOM AT MUNICIPAL BUILDING

A regular monthly Council Meeting of the Borough of Barrington was held with Mayor Hanson presiding.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Hanson called the meeting to order with the following statement: "This meeting is held in compliance with Chapter 231 of the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975 and appropriate notice has been given. Notice of the meeting was filed with the Retrospect and Courier Post and is also posted in the main office of the Borough Clerk where notices are primarily kept.

ROLL CALL

The Municipal Clerk called roll of Council with the following in attendance: Council President Beach, Councilman Beyer, Councilman Cerrito, Councilman Drumm, Councilwoman Mercado-Miller. Councilman Robenolt was absent with prior notice. Mayor Hanson, Municipal Clerk Terry Shannon, and Solicitor Timothy Higgins were also on the dais.

Sean's quick thinking in calling 9-1-1 saved Rich's life. Rich Constantine was also present to see Sean get this proclamation.

PUBLIC PORTION

Mayor Hanson advised that if you have comments or questions, please come forward and state your name for the record. Public comment is limited to five minutes per person. On a motion by Beyer, second by Mercado-Miller, the public portion of the meeting was opened.

Brittany Beyer, Chairperson for the Barrington Green Team, spoke with an update of the grant received from Sustainable New Jersey and the PSE&G Foundation. The grant was for the green initiative and stormwater management in town. With the grant, one hundred rain barrels were purchased, they published an interest form in Barrington on Track to see if residents wanted a free rain barrel--they had fifty-seven residents respond. If anyone is interested in receiving a rain barrel, please contact the Green Team. Ms. Beyer also thanked Mayor and Council and the Public Works Department for their support on these projects.

Seeing no further comments from the public, on a motion by Beach, second by Drumm, the public portion of the meeting was closed.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT BEACH – repeating former comments, our departments do an amazing job. You can see that tonight with Rich and Sean and our Police promotions. Leadership starts at the top. Thanks Chief, Dave, and Mike Ciocco, you can see it through and through all our departments. Brittany thanks for your commitment to the Green Team along with Councilman Cerrito, thank you. For our EMS Chief Kate Bowen and her donor Michael please continue your prayers for a healthy and speedy recovery. Thank you.

MAYOR HANSON – echoed comments wishing Chief Bowen and her donor Michael Ellershaw, a Lieutenant in the EMS Squad, a speedy recovery. If it is not evident by that that our staff here is more of a family than a staff, we are very proud of the group of individuals that work here in the borough. It is not just our Police that get training. You heard tonight that Sean Foster received training and other staff are in courses now. Everyone here is trying to better themselves from the top down, from the middle out, we are very well rounded and happy with our borough staff. We cannot thank them enough for all they do every day. Thaks Berry Caffeinated and Elevated Golf for organizing our town's first Farmers Market two weeks ago. Great turnout, great weather, very successful and two more dates coming up, including this Sunday 9am-2pm. Brews, Beats and Eats was postponed due to the weather until October 25. A little Food Pantry was installed at Deerefield, across from Union Grove Apartments. Thanks to our Public Works Department for building and installing the pantry. Residents and non-residents can donate food or if needed you can access the food, no questions asked, no lock, no camera. It has been emptied and filled multiple times already, so it is definitely getting its use. Mayor Hanson encouraged residents to be sure they are getting their information from proper sources before spreading any false information online. We cover this every other month, and probably will every other month. Proper sources are the people on this dais and the people in the audience representing the borough. Not your neighbor, not your sister, not a random cop from Bordentown.

You need to get your information from us before you disseminate that information and cause panic or mass chaos. We can work together, we can answer your questions, we are not hiding anything here. But we can't give you information unless you ask us for it or you come to a meeting. We also do not respond to Facebook comments.

Chief Minardi added that he can't urge people enough to call us if you have a question. We can't respond to every Facebook comment and people seem to be relying on Facebook and 99% of it is false. If you see something the Police need to know about, call us, don't post it on the neighbor's page. No one is responding to your house based on your Facebook posts. We cover this a lot, and we can't express enough to just call us. If you are worried about something you saw on Facebook, call us. The Chief also thanked Berry Caffeinated for hosting Coffee with a Cop. It was great turnout, they were great hosts, and we will do more there. Thanks to all the officers who ran the Junior Police Academy. It was our second year, Cpl. Lampe, SRO Bowman, and Sgt. Mulhearn were there all week with the kids and did a great job. Captain Pawling set up the program. It was a great success, and we look forward to growing that.
